 - Monarch Butterfly Population: Monarch butterflies undertake long-distance migrations between North America and Mexico. Populations of monarch butterflies are distributed across their breeding, migratory, and overwintering habitats, facing threats such as habitat loss and climate change.
- Great Barrier Reef Corol Population: The Great Barrier Reef harbors diverse corol
 populations, each comprising numerous corol polygs. These populations face threats
 from corol bleaching, ocean acidification, and pollution, endangering the reef's
 biodiversity.
- African Elephant Population: African elephants inhabit savannas, forests, and grasslands across sub-Saharan Africa. Populations of African elephants are threatened by habitat loss, poaching for ivery, and human-wildlife conflict.

 Endangered Species Populations: Many species face the risk of extinction due to declining populations. Examples include the black rhinoceros, Amur leopard, and mountain genille, whose populations are threatened by habitat destruction, posching, and other human activities.
