The Church Singing Alex Duke, Michael Lawrence, Carl Trueman, Matt Boswell, 2017-01-05 Singing is not one of the nine marks a point which not surprisingly has come up once or twice with my minister of music father That said okay yes 9Marks does have a few opinions on music Our understanding of the local church pushes us toward a slightly different perspective on church singing than some of our evangelical brothers and sisters The difference comes down to the question of performance Who is performing The congregation or the people on stage Dimming the lights and turning up the volume of instruments and leaders doesn't necessarily mean you have turned the congregation into an audience but it often does Or think about it like this is the worship experience in your church a solo transaction between the individual worshipper and God as stimulated by a high emotion performer up front Because here is an alternative the musicians and song leaders help to facilitate an intellectually and emotionally engaged communal experience where members sing to one another while singing to God The primary thing people hear is the faith reinforcing praises and laments of their fellow saints I m not the only one who rejoices like this mourns like this pleads like this So does everyone around me They don't listen for the organ electric quitar or praise ensemble They listen for the folksy and hearty voices of other pilgrims walking alongside them on this long and rocky road of Christian obedience rehearsing old memories of Calvary and new hopes of the heavenly city Are these just my preferences that I m trying to impose I hope not Think about what the New Testament emphasizes when it comes to the church's corporate music It doesn't talk about crafting a highly charged worship experience Interestingly it doesn't use the language of worship at all in this context which is not to deny that corporate singing is worship Instead the Bible talks about the congregation singing to one another Col 3 16 Eph 5 19 and doing everything for the sake of edifying one another 1 Cor 14 That's it people singing together When it comes to the topic of music Christians might do well to talk about the church singing or the congregation singing because that s what the Bible talks about In this edition of the 9Marks Journal we start with singing and the song Why do congregations sing what should they sing about and how can they sing better We then think more carefully about the music itself particularly with two different perspectives on whether or not some musical forms are better than others Finally we think about what is involved in leading music Let the Church Sing! but for comparison at Main St Baptist Church in Lexington Kentucky All of this enables her to analyze in detail how music is interwoven in the worship service how people feel about the music that they make and hear and more generally how the religious views so vividly expressed help the Church's members think about the relationship between themselves their community and the larger world Music and prayer enable the members and leaders of the Church to bring the realm of the spiritual into intersection with the material world in a particularly active way The book is enriched by extensive musical transcriptions and an accompanying CD of recordings from actual church services and these are examined in detail in the book itself Th r se Smith is in the Music Department University College Dublin **The Singing Thing** John L. Bell, 2000 This text is a highly accessible analysis by John L Bell one of the world's leading experts on congregational song Church Singing: History from the origins to the mid-seventeenth century Johann von Gardner, 1980 The history of church singing in Russia constitutes an essential aspect of that nation's culture and musical history For the first 650 years from the Christianization of Rus in the year 988 liturgical chant was the only documentable art music in that vast territory that eventually became the modern nations of Russia Ukraine and Belarus Indeed in Russia before the revolution of 1917 liturgical musicology was a bona fide scholarly discipline taught in conservatories universities and theological seminaries All activity in the field came to a halt however during the 75 year Soviet era when the study and practice of sacred music was severely repressed for ideological reasons with a resulting lack of published research and secondary material Consequently Russian and Western music historians church musicians and liturgical scholars as well as ordinary church goers whose interest in Orthodox Christianity and its art has been increasing of late have been deprived of reference works that would impart even a general knowledge of the history and development of liturgical singing in the Russian Orthodox Church The present Volume Russian Church Singing Volume 2 is the second installment of Professor Johann von Gardner's monumental work to appear in English translation The 396 page volume translated and edited by Dr Vladimir Morosan considers the development and practice of liturgical chant in the Russian lands from a variety of aspects its origins and the various cultural influences upon its formation extant manuscripts the evolution of the notation and the problematics of deciphering it into modern day notes the forces involved in its performance its stylistic evolution from exclusively monodic forms to improvised and eventually notated polyphony its earliest known composers and performing ensembles its aesthetics in relation to liturgy the language and the various problems that arose over the centuries resulting in the adoption of Westernized stylistic models around the year 1650 which marks the approximate end of the time period covered in this volume Much of this information is made accessible for the first time to the English reader and will be of interest both to the specialist and to the general reader generating a healthy demand for further research and exploration into this fascinating and hitherto unknown field Book iacket **Singers and Songs of the Church** Josiah Miller, 1869 **Sing!** Keith Getty, Kristyn Getty, 2017 Author songwriter and worship leader Keith Getty and wife Kristyn write to church members to remind them why the Church should
