Conscionement

- Dual Processing: The principle that information is perceived, remembered and thought both consciously and unconsciously at the same time.
 - Conscious Processing: Deliberate ("High Road")
 - Unconscious Processing: Automatic ("Low Road")
- Blindsight: The ability for a person who cannot see to be able to respond to visual stimulus (like if a blind person was able to avoid a trash can in front of him)
- Selective Attention: Focusing on one particular stimulus out of all the stimulus around oneself.
- Cocktail Party Effect: The ability to attend to only one voice out of many.
- Inattentional Blindness: The inability to notice a visible object because your attention is elsewhere.
- Change Blindness: When there is a visual stimulus alters but the observer is unaware
 of the alteration.
- Change Deafness: When an audible stimulus (noise) alters, including its tone, pitch, and/or volume but the listener is unaware of the alteration.

Sleep

- Circadian Rhythm: The body's internal (biological) sleep-wake clock.
 - It can be affected by age and experience
- · Stages of Sleep
 - Hypnagogic State: The dreamlike state which occurs before sleep.
 - Quite Sleep: Occurs stages 1 to 4, nRem (not Rem).
 - Active Sleep: Rem, dreams most likely occur in active sleep.
 - Individual Stages of Sleep
 - Stage 1
 - Alpha waves
 - · Signalled by twitches
 - Lasts 10minutes
 - If awoken people in stage 1 don't think they were asleep
 - Stage 2
 - Spindles
 - Stage 2 takes up 50% of a person's sleep time
 - Stage 3
 - Delta waves
 - Lasts about 30minutes
 - · The body begins slowing down (example: breathing slows)
