Structural Guidelines For An "I Believe" Essay

Introduction

Begin with a statement or personal anecdote that introduces your belief to capture the reader's attention.

Body

Explain your belief by sharing personal experiences, supporting ideas, or observations that add depth to your statement.

Conclusion

Revisit your belief and provide a final takeaway. Reinforce the importance of the belief and leave a lasting impression on the reader.
